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Reading	<p>Read the information about Georgia O'Keeffe and answer the questions.</p> <p>If Georgia O'Keeffe interests you, try researching her and see what else you can find out!</p>	Reading Georgia O'Keeffe (on website)
Writing	<p><u>Instructions</u></p> <p>After studying potions for a few weeks now, you are ready to teach others how to make a potion!</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. Look at the Potion Instructions example on the website. 2. Decide what your potion is going to be for and write a title. 3. Write a list of ingredients that are needed to make your potion. 4. Write the steps of how to make the potion. Use a numbered list for these. Try to start your sentences in different ways. <p><u>Challenge</u></p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. Add in an an introduction to encourage your reader to want to make your potion. 2. Add details to the steps to make sure that the reader makes your potion accurately. 3. Add in an ending about what should have happened after having the potion. <p>Be imaginative and have fun deciding on the ingredients and how to make your potion!</p>	Potion Instructions Example (on website)

Subject	Task	Resources to Support
Science	<p><u>The Water Cycle</u> Set up your own mini water cycle to see what happens as water (a liquid) turns into a gas and then back into a liquid.</p> <p><u>How to set it up</u> Put some water into a small plastic bag (like a sandwich bag). Seal the bag and tape it to a window that catches the sun. As the water warms up, observe what happens inside the bag over a few days.</p> <p><u>What you should see – look at this afterwards!</u> You should see the water evaporates (turns from liquid to gas – you will only see the water level lower), then condenses (turns from gas to liquid at the top of the bag) and then precipitates back down as it cools (just like rain).</p> <p><u>Explain</u> Try to explain what has happened! Subject	Task	Resources to Support
History	<p><u>The Stone Age – Cave Paintings</u></p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. Look through the information about cave paintings. There are questions to think about as you go through. 2. Create a cave painting example of your own. There are different ways that you could do this: <ol style="list-style-type: none"> a. Try to draw your own animals that they may have drawn at the time. b. Stick paper to the underside of a table or desk (like you are in a cave) and then try to create your design. If you have chalk, you could try using that to create it. c. Paint the design onto coarse sandpaper as this is similar to the rough surface of a cave. d. Roll out a piece of clay or Playdoh to about 1cm thick and then use a twig to carve the drawing. <p><u>Extra challenge</u> Research some of the major sites in Europe where Stone Age cave art can still be seen!</p>	<p>Stone Age Cave Paintings Information (on website)</p> <p>https://www.dkfindout.com/uk/history/stone-age/cave-painting/ (Information about cave paintings)</p>
