Cut up the cards, listen out for the words are you read the story.


Can you then put the cards into groups of rhyming words?

## Barlow's Top Tips.

Rhyming words do not always use the same graphemes to represent the same sounds, e.g. the ai in snail is coded by the a-i spelling and in whale is is coded by a split diagraph. We learn more about alternate ways of spelling when we cover phase 5 in phonics. At the moment we encourage you to sound the word out and use the phonemes you are familiar with. In this activity we are focusing on phase 3 rhyming words.






Writing in the story the snail had and itchy foot and wanted to see the world. If you had itchy feet where would you want to go and why?

How will you stick the foot and the shell together?






Physical Development it is really important we continue to develop fine motor skills. This craft will require you to fold paper accurately and cut paper accurately.

First fold 4-5 double pages of an old newspaper into thickish strips.

Then roll the first strip lengthways and fix it with sticky tape. Roll the next strip over it and fix it again. Continue winding up further strips until a nice snail shell is created.
