Guide to challenge levels:



Mild- all children should be able to access this, it should feel comfortable.



Hot- some children should be able to access this, it should feel a little bit tricky.



Super hot- few children should access this and might need adult support, feel the burn.

You can explore some of the other games on Phonics Play, you should be able to independently play all of the phase 3 games.

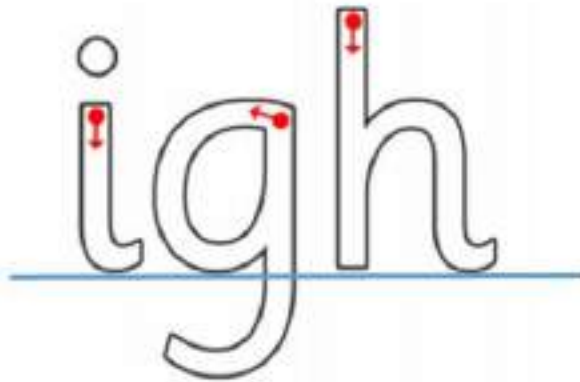


Listen to a phoneme and choose the grapheme that represents it.

- o Check you have 1 small letter, 1 descender and one tall letter.



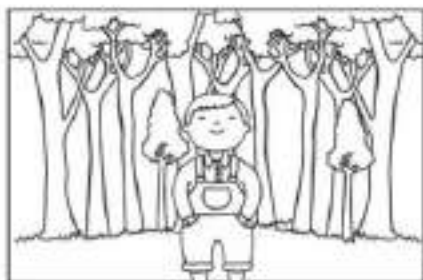
Barlow's top tips
Make sure your h has an tall ascender, otherwise we might get confused and think it is a n.





Practise here is a short story that feature the **igh** sound, have a go at finding all the **igh** words.

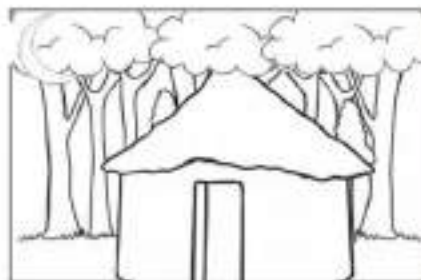
The Light in the Night

Barlow's top tip
We can often find it tricky to remember the order these letters go in, if we read it lots we can train our brains to remember the order.

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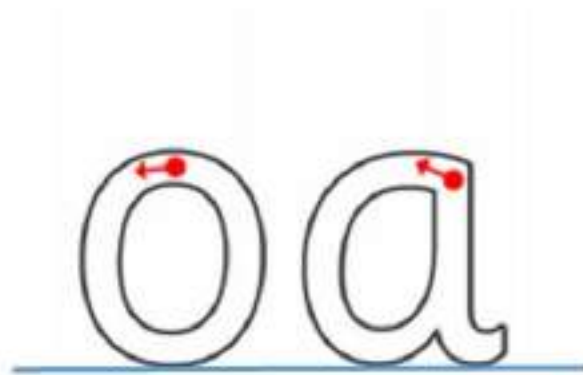

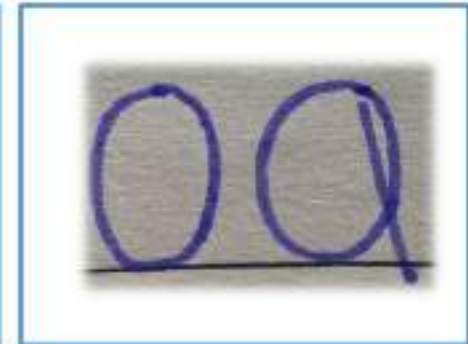

I have heard that lots of you are thinking about how you can make your handwriting even better. Humphrey has had a go at writing today's phoneme, can you give him some feedback?

Things to think about:

- o Are the letters in the correct order?
- o Are the letters sitting on the line?
- o Are the letters the correct size?
- o Are the letters formed correctly?

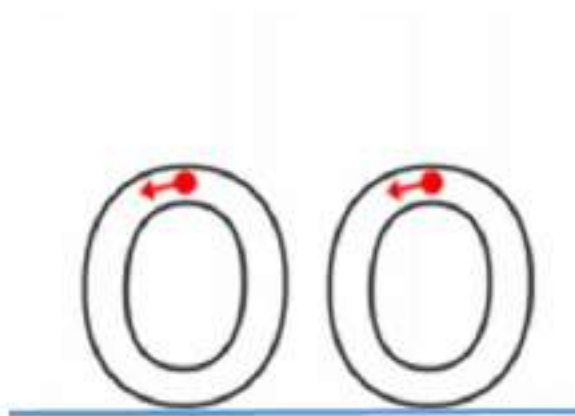

- o There are no ascenders (tall letters) or descenders (letters that go below the line).
- o Write 5 "oo" in your book, put a star next to the one you have formed the most accurately.



Barlow's top tips

This digraph represents 2 different phonemes

- "oo" as in book is a short and bouncy sound.
- "oo" as in moon is a longer stretchy sound.
